The end of NRW was celebrated with National Mabo Day on 3 June, which is such an important day to remember for every one of us. Eddie (Koiki) Mabo is an inspiration, and his story should be shared far and wide.

In 1982, Koiki and four other Murray Islanders started a land rights action in the High Court of Australia. They claimed their land rights had not been extinguished when the Islands became a colony of Queensland in 1879.

Ten (10) years later, and sadly six (6) months after Koiki died the Hight Court handed down the groundbreaking judgement that gave rise to the Mabo Decision and the Native Title Act 1993. The Act recognised land ownership, officially acknowledging the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Australia to own and use the land on which their families had lived for millennia.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, the executive team and all staff at Kambu health we honour and pay our respect to the legacy of Eddie Koiki Mabo (29.06.1936 – 21.01.1992)

What's your most-used productivity hack at work?

Scheduling my workflow so I know what's coming up, by when and who I need to include to make sure that the work is completed appropriately. I have different excel spreadsheets to remind me of the timeframes for the different contracts and workflow processes.

What motivates you at work?

Having people around me that share the same values I do. Knowing that what I am doing is contributing to a better service and that the people that I work with are seeking to do the same thing.

What's something you're proud of?

This is difficult because there are a number of things, I am proud of, I am proud of my son who is turning 13 this year and is a remarkable young boy showing the nurture and compassion for other people that both Sarah and I have tried to show him over the years. For me though it is the fact that I am ok being back at work again following a prolonged absence and struggling with mental health and for getting the support needed to be in the workplace again.

Who inspires you?

Lots of different people for a whole bunch of different reasons. My mentors that taught me so much, my family that rise through the different challenges being thrown at them and the people that support them while going through their own health issues, especially my brother-in-law who is living proof of the 'I will be there in sickness' part of his vows to my sister.

When you were a kid, what did you want to be when you grew up?

I remember being asked this as a child in Primary School and the standard answer was always the same, Policeman, Fireman, or Farmer. Obviously, none of them ever eventuated, but somewhere in High School / growing up I wanted to be in a job that could help people.




The Amaroo Director and the educating staff at Amaroo Kindergarten and Education Transition, have been instrumental in achieving great things when providing a quality education and care program.

FOCUS ON YOUR HEALTH

BOWEL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

June is Bowel Cancer Awareness Month to raise awareness of Australia's second most fatal cancer, dedicated to prevention, early diagnosis, research, quality treatment and the best care for everyone affected by bowel cancer.

Bowel cancer claims the lives of 101 Australians every week (5,255 people a year) but it's one of the most treatable types of cancer if found early. While the risk of bowel cancer increases significantly with age, the disease doesn't discriminate, affecting men and women, young & old.

Bowel Cancer Australia recommends participating in screening appropriate to your personal level of risk, for people at average or near average risk of bowel cancer, Australian medical guidelines recommend screening using a faecal immunochemical test (FIT) every 2 years between ages 50-74.

The guidelines also state GPs can offer a faecal immunochemical test every 2 years to people aged 45-49 who request it, after being fully informed of the benefits of testing

Deadly Choices GOOD QUICK TUKKA RECIPES

THIS TUNA MORNAY RECIPE IS GREAT COMFORT FOOD FOR A COOL WINTERS NIGHT

INGREDIENTS

- 1 onion
- 2 zucchinis
- 1-2 carrots
- 1 packet salt reduced spring onion soup mix
- 425g can tuna drained
- 1/2 cup brown lentils
- 1/2 can light evaporated milk
- 1 tablespoon seeded/wholegrain mustard
- 1 tablespoon dried mixed herbs

Serves 4 - 6

EQUIPMENT

Chopping board

Baking tray/oven tray

Saucepan

Mixing spoons

Large bowls

Grater

Sharp knives

METHOD

- 1. Pre heat oven to 180C.
- 2. Cook the rice in the microwave, rice cooker or boil with water.
- 3. Spray/grease baking dish.
- 4. Place all of the ingredients (except the cheese & rice) in a large bowl and combine. Add the drained rice once cooled.
- 5. Transfer the mixture to the baking dish and smooth out.
- 6. Sprinkle grated cheese over the top.
- 7. Bake for about 20-30 mins or until golden on top.
